

Q1 Did you attend Biodiversity_Next in Leiden, Netherlands?


Q2 Which of the organizer or partner organizations are you a member or have an affiliation?


Q3 How did you learn about Biodiversity_Next?



Q8 How did you use the app at this conference? Select all that apply.




